The Cold War ended almost two decades ago. But the Bush Administration wants to spend over \$100 million in 2008 alone on a program to design and eventually build a whole new generation of nuclear weapons.

Our Senator, Byron Dorgan, can decide whether this dangerous, destabilizing program goes forward. We applaud his previous leadership that helped stop so-called bunker buster nuclear bombs. Now, we urge him to use that leadership to eliminate funding for this latest scheme to build new nuclear bombs we don't need.

- America already has nearly 10,000 nuclear weapons, each one far more powerful than the bomb that destroyed Hiroshima.
- America's current nuclear weapons are safe and reliable — and will remain that way for at least another 50 years and possibly much longer.
- Building new nuclear warheads will undermine U.S. and global efforts to prevent other nations and terrorist groups from acquiring nuclear weapons.

Nuclear weapons remain one of the gravest and most immediate threats to human civilization. Building a new generation of nuclear warheads will make us — and the world — less safe and less secure.
