

Pulling up our seats to the tables of power

In growing numbers, women are taking seats at the tables of power. This brings new challenges, and new opportunities. How do we make our voices heard at the table? How do we use that power to make significant and lasting change in our communities and our country? The ninth WILL/WAND national conference raised these questions, and then provided some good answers and some good strategies.

For three inspiring days on Capitol Hill, hundreds of women legislators and community leaders from across the country gathered for vital training and strategizing. We celebrated the gains women are making. We addressed the challenge of amplifying women's voices in pressing policy debates. We shared our visions and our hopes for our communities and our country. Some highlights of the conference:

- Lively interactive trainings sharpened skills on making the most of media opportunities, framing effective messages, deflecting attacks, and reaching new audiences.
- Marian Wright Edelman's lifetime of dedicated service was recognized with the 2007 Torchbearer Award. She inspired with her urgent call to ensure a bright future by truly leaving no child behind.
- Jane Fonda accepted our Keeping the Faith Award, and addressed the challenges of overcoming the barriers to women's voices and views being fully represented at every level of media. She engaged with panelists Carol Jenkins (Women's Media Center) and author/activist Ellen Bravo (*Taking on the Big Boys*) in a dynamic discussion.
- Jeanne Shaheen, former New Hampshire Governor, and Colorado Senate President Joan Fitz-Gerald inspired us as they launched their bids for Congress.
- Illinois Senate Majority Leader Debbie Halvorson, fueled by the energy and encouragement at the conference, made the decision to run for Congress in 2008. **"The more I listened to these groups, the more I talked to other people in Congress, the more I realized this was not about me, it's not about titles. It's about what I can do for the people and the country,"** Halvorson said.
- At meetings with Members of Congress, nearly 40 state constituent delegations talked about the Iraq war, the military budget, plans for new nuclear weapons, and a new study on how we can create more jobs without adding more weapons to our obsolete arsenal of military gadgets and weapons systems.
- Special challenges for women in the workforce were highlighted by Valarie Long of SEIU and Naomi Walker of AFL-CIO. Pollster Celinda Lake and Page Gardner (Women's Voices.Women's Vote.) focused on central issues facing women and their families, the unique concerns of unmarried women, and the potential of mobilizing female voters.
- Noted author U.S. Army Sergeant Kayla Williams and U.S. Army Sergeant Carolyn Schapper shared experiences of women serving in our armed forces.

The urgency of bringing women's voices to help shape true national security was amplified in vitally important sessions on: federal budget priorities, women's political empowerment, and domestic preparedness. **The time is right, and we are here to take our seats at the tables where these conversations happen.**

The WILL/WAND 2007 conference illuminated the vital issues of our day and showcased inspiring women who are leading in state legislatures and in the U.S. Congress.
